LECTURE SERIES

THE OPERATION OF THE NEW JERSEY PENSION AND ANNUITY FUND LAW

You are undoubtedly investing varying sums of money monthly in the New Jersey Pension and Annuity Fund. What do you know about your investment in this fund?

Miss Ida E. Housman, President of the Council of Teachers' Organizations of New Jersey, whose book, "Pension Facts for Teachers" has recently been published, will present such topics relative to the fund as follows:

Evolution, benefits, superannuation retirement, disability retirement, administration, supervision, constitutionality of pension legislation. There will be ten lectures in the series on Tuesdays from February 21 to May 2, 1939, from 4:15 to 6:00 P. M. at the College Building at 185 Broadway. The fee is five (\$5.00) dollars.

OVERVIEW OF MODERN ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

This course is designed for teachers, supervisors, and administrators who while concerned with specific problems in their own field, desire to gain a comprehensive grasp or perspective of the entire modern elementary school program. Specialists in the various fields will present lectures on the different phases of elementary education, followed by a summarization by the chairman, and informal discussion period.

Brooks, Health Instructor; Lois Meredith French, Department of Education; Dr. Lenore Vaughn-Eames, Speech Clinician; Dr. Martha Downs, Head of Department of Mathematics; Guy V. Bruce, Head of the Science Department; John J. Hatch, Head of Fine and Industrial Arts Department; Dr. M. Ernest Townsend, President, all of the State Teachers College at Newark; Dr. John A. Spargo, Supervising Principal, Nutley; Paul H. Oliver, Director of Music, Newark Public Schools; Dr. Sarah B. Askew, Secretary of New Jersey Public Library Commission; Dr. Robert H. Morrison, Director of Teacher Training, State Department of Public Instruction; Dr. John R. Patterson, Supervising Principal, Millburn; Dr. Stanley H. Rolfe, Superintendent of Schools, Newark. The course will offer two or four semester hours of credit.

Students desiring four semester hours of credit will be required to complete a study of a pertinent educational problem under the supervision of Dr. Milligan.

PREVENTIVE MEDICINE IN CIVIL GOVERNMENT

The Part-Time and Extension Division is fortunate in securing the services of Dr. Haven Emerson of Columbia University, who will offer in "Preventive Medicine in Civil Government" a review of the origin, development, organization, and results of public health services as these are now provided under local, state, national, and international auspices. The preventable diseases and the importance of their control, with which health departments are chiefly concerned, will be dealt with from the point of view of their social and economic significance.

Dr. Emerson has had a long and varied experience in medicine and health education. In New York City he has been connected with the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and Bellevue Hospital, and from 1915 to 1917 served as President of the Board of Health and Commissioner of the Department of Health. He has been director of many health and hospital surveys made in this country and abroad. He has been decorated with the Medaille des Epidemies and Chevalier Legion d'Honneur by France and the Distinguished Service Medal by the United States.

Well known as an administrator and lecturer, Dr. Emerson has made outstanding contributions to health education and medicine as author of "Alcohol, Its Effect on Man" and many other publications.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

How many future delinquents do you have in your classroom? "The schools contribute to juvenile delinquency," scream the headlines of recent New Jersey newspapers. Do they? Do you know that the New Jersey Juvenile Delinquency Commission recently reported that many institutionalized boys **feel** that teachers and schools not only have not assisted them to avoid delinquency, but actually by ill-advised attitudes and disciplinary measures have contributed to their anti-social behavior? Dr. Dean will present such topics as: the part which the teacher and the school play in the delinquency picture; remedial techniques and procedures; mental hygiene, and the presentation of a comprehensive, integrated attack on the whole problem of juvenile delinquency.

TRAINABILITY OF THE EMOTIONS: AN EDUCATIVE PROCESS

This course will avail itself of the research in emotion and the educative process, made by a Commission appointed by the American Council on Education, and directed by Dr. Daniel A. Prescott, released in the publication entitled, "Emotion and the Educative Process". The course will offer a scientific exploration of the role played by emotional motivation in the emerging life of the elementary school child. Special emphasis will be placed on the physiology and psychology of emotional behavior, and its educational implications. Techniques for the interpretation and educational direction of normal emotional drives will be proposed in the light of the latest scientific findings.

THE INDIANS OF NEW JERSEY

This course, to be given by Mr. Charles Philhower, an authority on Indian life in New Jersey, will be concerned with such questions as: who were the Indians of New Jersey, where did they come from, how did they live, and what became of them. An attempt will be made to identify the Indians who lived in various localities in New Jersey, their trails and movements, and to interpret Indian names, the use of various implements, and the significance of the many archeological finds in the State. Throughout the course, consideration will be given to the use of this knowledge in the classroom, and its appeal to various grade levels.
